### **Transition Exams**

### 1. National Primary School Exam (NPSE)

- National examination taken in the sixth and final year of primary school
- Students take **five subjects;** with maximum score of 100 in each
- Total maximum score is 500; minimum national pass mark is 230
- Successful students transition into junior secondary school



#### 2. Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE)

- National examination taken in the third and final year of **junior secondary school**
- Students take eight subjects; best score is 1 (excellent), worst is 7 (fail)
- The minimum national pass mark is 36; with a score of 6 (pass) across 6 subjects
- Successful students transition into senior secondary school or technical and vocational education programs



#### 3. West African Senior School Certificate Examination (WASSCE)

- International examination taken in the third and final year of **senior secondary school**
- Students take up to nine subjects; best score is 1 (excellent), worst is 9 (fail)
- A credit score is C4-C6 and a pass is D7-E8
- Different requirements to transition into higher and technical institutions

There are **two national and one international transition exams** in Sierra Leone. These exams are developed, conducted and graded by the West African Examinations Council (WAEC). This report will focus on basic education, that is, **NPSE and BECE results** for the period **2016-2021** 



### 1. National Primary School Exam (NPSE)

- Taken in the sixth and final year of primary school
- Students take five subjects, with maximum score of 100 in each



### 2. Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE)


- Taken in the third and final year of junior secondary school
- Students take eight subjects; best score is 1 (excellent); worst is 7 (fail)
- The minimum pass mark is 36 with a score of 6 across 6 subjects
- Successful students transition into senior secondary school or TVETs

# 1. NPSE: Since 2018 the number of students passing has increased by 27%, or 26,815 students




Students take five subjects, with maximum score of 100 in each. Total maximum score is 500. Minimum passing score is 230 to go to junior secondary school.


# 2. BECE: Since 2018 the number of students passing has increased by 60%, or 39,029 students
