# **Curriculum Elements for Arabic Language**

# **Subject description**

This curriculum is designed to inculcate the learner's command of listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. It is intended that with these skills at their disposal, the learners will master Arabic grammar and usage.

# Rationale for the Inclusion of Arabic in the Senior Secondary School Curriculum

The curriculum is set to:

- Enable students to understand the Arabic speaking peoples and their culture.
- · Master basic rules of Arabic grammar.
- Improve students' knowledge of functional writing.
- Translate from Arabic into English and vice versa.
- Understand the different genres of Arabic Literature.
- Facilitate an interaction process that allows for the generation and practice of Arabic within and beyond the classroom.
- Empower non-Arabic speaking students in the country and beyond to understand and communicate in Arabic.

- Communicate effectively in Arabic using both the spoken and written word.
- Study and work effectively and efficiently where Arabic is used as a medium of communication.
- Understand the periods of Arabic literature.
